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


in action: "We walk by faith not sight" (2 Cor 5:7). Faith is a shield against sin and evil in our lives (Eph. 6:16).

SD-9s, NORTHTOWN and the GOSPEL

y name is John Stewart. I am a railroad engineer for the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad. I hired out on the railroad in July of 1990. At that time railroad engineers worked on jobs switching cars in the yard or on transfers bringing cars from one vard to another. They worked industry jobs servicing companies along the mainline in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and Saint Paul. Those jobs are done by switchmen nowadays. They do this by using remote control belt-packs to run the locomotive and move the cars. BNSF still has engineers on train crews, working the Monticello and Hinckley Locals and in the long pool which is where I work. We bring trains to Dilworth, Minnesota, from our home terminal at Northtown Yard in the Cities North-Metro area.

We stay at a hotel in Fargo, North Dakota, and when we are rested, we take another train back to the Twin Cities.

Our crews also have begun the commuter passenger service out of Minneapolis, running to and from Big Lake, Minnesota, with all the stations in between. Sometimes the freight trips will be to take coal cars to the power plant at Becker or a train of empty cars to be loaded at the quarry in St. Cloud or to park the train at Staples. There another crew will pick it up. You might bring your train into the yard, moving your engines to the roundhouse to be serviced and fueled. You might stop right at the yard office or on the mainline, while another crew brings your train further toward its destination. There are coal trains, vehide trains, merchandise trains, UPS, intermodal, and many more. We work and are called for work at any time of day or night. Getting the proper rest ahead of time is not always easy. Having a normal schedule is usually out of the question and it takes time to adjust to that kind of work. Trips usually last 8 to 12 hours and then we have a minimum of 10 ½ hours rest.

In 1994, my first year as an engineer, we switched in the yard, building trains with engines that were so well designed that we used them until just a few years ago. They were called **SD9s**, built by General Motors in the 1950s.

They looked like rectangular green and orange boxes with 6 wheels underneath. They have been replaced by the **SD40s** we had used on road trains not so long ago. Most of the road power we now use to get our trains over the road have been built in this century. A lot of the older units have been stored or traded in for more powerful and fuel-efficient engines.

We start out our long-pool trips by getting the paperwork on our train at the yard office. This informs us all about the weight, length, contents of the cars, what engines we will use, and other things we need to know. A lot of employees are involved with getting our train ready to go before we get to take it out on our part of the journey.

The Burlington Northern Santa Fe employs Carmen, Yardmasters, Policemen, Drivers, Trackmen, Signalmen, Managers and many others who help us during our tour of duty. Both men and women hold these positions. The dispatchers give us paperwork to know at what milepost we have to call work gangs so their foreman can help us to safely pass through the area. Track gangs may be fixing tracks, bridges and other things that need to be maintained. Sometimes we have to stop and wait temporarily until the necessary work is completed. We also have information to show us what the temporary speed restrictions are at a given location. We have a variety of *Green, Yellow* and *Red* signals to direct traffic. The dispatcher will give us at least two track warrants to get us through the territory that requires them. Eagles, deer, raccoons, cows, rabbits and horses keep us company along the way. We visit cities, towns and farms. We see beautiful sunrises, sunsets, harvest moons, thunderstorms, snowstorms, fall colors, kids in fishing boats with the grownups, snowmobilers, and so much more. Unusual September flooding in the upper Midwest has provided all the railroads with operating challenges.

When I was growing up, I played with model trains. My parents took me on train rides. One of my favorite childhood

memories was watching the Casey Jones Show on TV. Being a railroader and riding on trains seemed like a great job. There is still enough of that little boy in me to still look forward to riding the rails as I work.

I have found throughout my career there is something more enjoyable than trains. I have heard this expression many times and I can attest to it -"The best part of my job is the people I work with." Railroaders are your ex-When one person tended family. needs help or encouragement, they don't have to wait very long before one or more *Rails* gladly steps in to meet the need. I have been on the receiving end of these acts of kindness countless times. Rails are hard-working, fun -loving people who have many interests and activities outside the job to keep them busy. It is fun to catch up and find out what is new in their lives.

The most important thing I can share with my friends is that Jesus is my Lord and Savior. He wants to save them from hell, like He did me, and take them to Heaven someday. Not only that, but He wants to help them with whatever they have to face in this life. I believe God has brought the **Railroad Evangelistic Association** across my path to help Mark Lorenz and Steve Seidler start a **REA** Chapter in the Twin Cities for railworkers, railfans, model railroaders and whoever God sends our way. Jesus is the answer and we want everyone to know Him.





Norfolk & Western Railway, #2145 at Hagerstown, MD in the early 1950s. This massive Y6b, with a 2-8-8-2 wheel arrangement, was built in their Roanoke Shops and saw service hauling coal from Bluefield down to the docks at Norfolk. Shots like this give y ou extremely important pictorial info to enable y ou to weather scale models. The work car in the background gives y ou lettering information. It pays to be well read on locomotive specifications. Since this locomotive was built during World War II, I knew the N&W used cast aluminum to forge the headlight. In the late 1950s this locomotive was being scrapped on River Road in Cincinnati. I was able to inform the scrapper they could not use the headlight since it was aluminum and so I was allowed to remove the light. As a teen at the time, I did not have proper tools so I used a piece of steel bar to break off the four large bolts. When I got the headlight down and into my father's station wagon, the scrapper realized I was in earnest and asked if I would like the engineer's seat out of the cab. Climbing up, I found the seat bolted down, but used the steel bar to break those bolts to free up the seat. Inside were all the boiler inspection sheets on #2145 from its last service before "end-of the-line." The headlight and engineer's seat now sit outside my train room. Visitors y oung and old like to take a turn sitting in the engineer's seat. I re-wired the headlight from 35v steam generator to 120v household current, replaced the 300-watt bulb with a 75-watt clear bulb, and polished the reflector. Now it will warm y ou from five feet away. The headlight is mounted on a rolling stand so I can take it when I speak as "The Trainman." I use it to tell the story of how Queen Victoria, a believer, was saved when God sent a moth into the headlight on her train and the



waving "arms" slowed, then stopped the train 200 y ards before a trestle washout.

Chicago & Northwestern passenger train with an E-unit on the front end, arriving from Chicago. This shot was taken at the C&NW Depot near Railroad Avenue in Duluth, Minnesota with my "trusty" Brownie camera in 1959. Note the imposing dark brick depot in the background. The Great Northern and Northern Pacific had their own depot just a block west of this depot. Information gleaned in this shot tells you only one locomotive was needed to bring this train in at this time. The station platform was built on a curve so they could fit the station surroundings into the available land. Building this curved platform would be a nice modeling challenge. Note the under-roof detail – "t" crossbeams and bell lampshades with a single bulb. I cannot remember why I was fortunate to be in town to take this shot on this day as we usually picked up my father 30 miles prior to the train entering Duluth. 

Join us at our next REA convention, September 12-16, 2011 as we celebrate 70 years of Railway ministry!


